p. 6. NAHACKY'S ANGELFISH - text updated, photo updated.

... Kosaki named it after his friend Tony Nahacky, who in 1988 caught a stray individual of the same as-yet-unnamed species off Hōnaunau, Hawai'i, at 115 ft.

The fish was not seen again in Hawai'i until 2011, when Gerard Newman found one at 150 ft. off Hōnaunau. In 2013 the author photographed another off South Point at 100 ft. With only 3 confirmed sightings, this is easily Hawai'i's rarest angelfish. It is related to the Multicolor Angelfish (*C. multicolor*), common elsewhere in the tropical Pacific...

p. 91. HAWAIIAN CONGER - length updated

2nd line from bottom: To ~~almost 4~~ about 5 1/2 ft.

(based on new state record for a 67-inch "White Eel / tohei" caught in North Kohala on the Big Island in December 2013. The eel was 18 inches in diameter.)

.... Typically occurring in shallow protected embayments, [even where the water is brackish](#), these fish are usually coated with filamentous algae and silt and thus easy to overlook....
